Office of Vocational Rehabilitation (OVR)

The state currently recommends that all students apply to OVR by the spring of their junior year or two years before graduating, if staying beyond the senior year. To apply, visit the <u>PA Career Link</u> website, create a log in, and look for the OVR button. The PA Career Link site can also be used to research a variety of occupations.
